Senior Place Receives Music Therapy Grant

German Centre is thrilled to announce it has been awarded a \$117,221 grant from the Alzheimer's Association Center for Dementia Respite Innovation (CDRI). One of only 41 recipients selected from over 200 applicants nationwide, German Centre will use the funding to launch a dedicated Music Therapy Program at its longstanding Adult Day Health Program, Senior Place.

This innovative program will offer participants living with dementia structured, evidence-based music therapy designed to align with their individual care plans. These sessions will promote self-expression, connection, and cognitive stimulation.

"Caring for someone with dementia can be both emotionally and physically overwhelming," said Mary Beth Caruso, Executive Director of Senior Place. "This grant allows us to enhance our services in a deeply human way—through music. It's a powerful tool that evokes memory, strengthens bonds, and brings joy, even in the face of cognitive decline."



Resident Spotlight

A Life of Purpose: Meet Florence Slepian

At 96, Florence Slepian has lived a life marked by intellect, service, and reinvention. Born just a mile from Edelweiss Village at the New England Hospital for Women and Children, Florence's journey has taken her across the country and back again, but she has always called Boston home.

A clinically trained social worker, Florence rose through the ranks of some of the nation's most esteemed medical institutions. She led social work and case management departments, taught at Catholic University, and served as Head of Renal Social Workers at Georgetown University Hospital. It was the encouragement of high-ranking physician colleagues that ultimately led her back to Boston, joining the Peter Bent Brigham/Robert Breck Brigham/Boston Lying-In Hospital system (now Brigham and Women's Hospital) at the time of its merger. Recruited by six physicians, she accepted a lower salary to be closer to her father in Brookline and went on to lead utilization review and continuing care, as well as many other departments, as a Vice President for 15 years. After retiring, Florence launched a second career in real estate, where she worked alongside her dear friend Stephen—still her best friend today.

Florence has two daughters, one nearby in Jamaica Plain and one in New Hampshire. She was married for 26 years to a brilliant mathematician. She is a lover of art and music and a devoted gardener who now tends a vegetable plot at Edelweiss Village.

After several hospitalizations and increasing falls at home, Florence knew it was time for a change. She moved into rehab at German Centre in June 2023, where she especially appreciated the care of her physical therapist, Olga. Days later, she made Edelweiss Village her new home.

Today, Florence continues to live with grace and independence, cooking for herself, managing her finances, attending art and current events classes, and dining with friends in the Edelweiss Village dining room each evening. Her apartment is a reflection of her life: filled with beautiful treasures and memories. She loves to visit with the Roxbury Latin School boys and enjoys birdwatching, shopping, and thoughtful conversation.

"I hated not working," Florence says. At Edelweiss Village, her days remain full—with purpose, connection, and joy.
